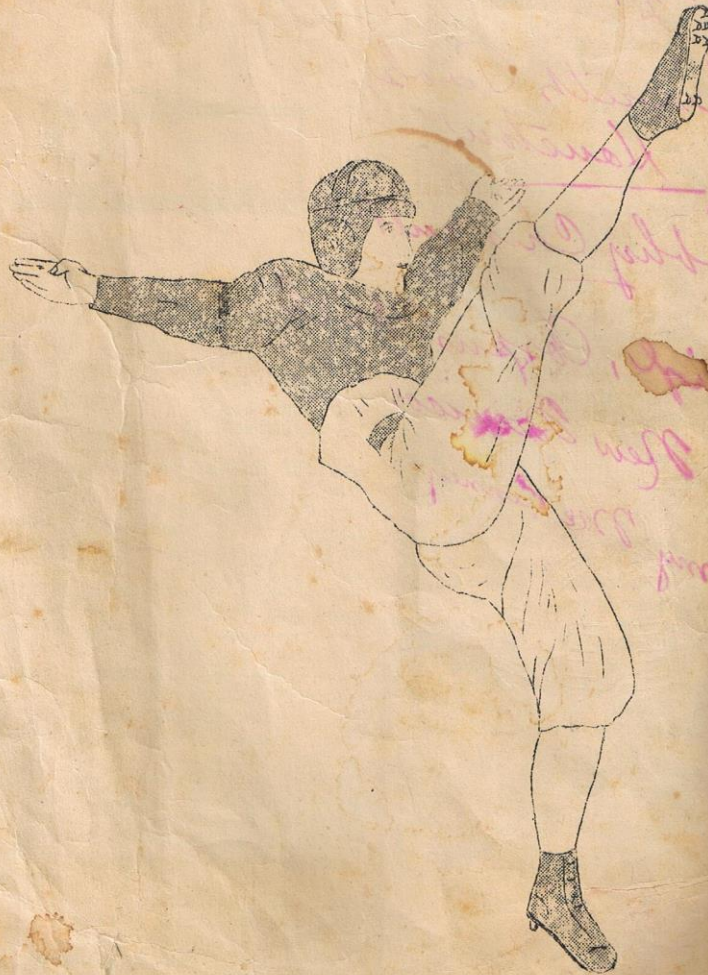

Craft, and Beulah Lee Brown.

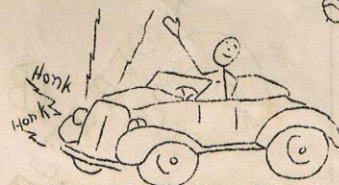
The seniors also voted to
